Babysitter Interview Questions

What would you do if the child refuses to go to bed at the designated time?

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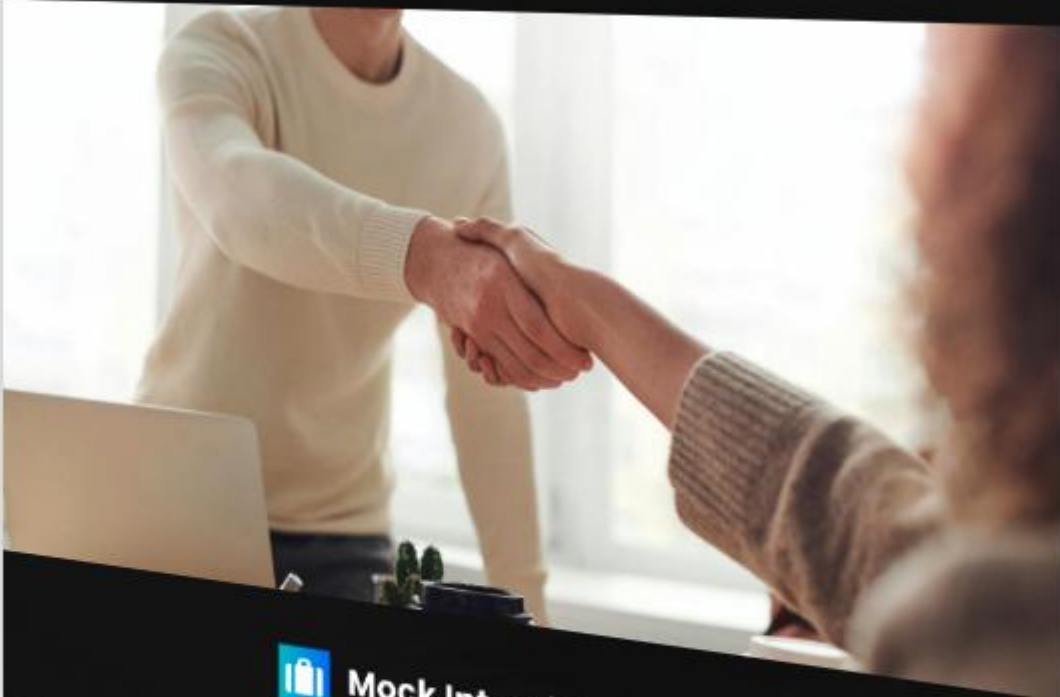
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How would you engage a child in an educational activity during babysitting?
