Discuss any relevant strategies or techniques you've learned to manage stress and maintain efficiency during high-pressure situations. Highlight the importance of teamwork and communication.



Sample Answer

As a Certified Nursing Assistant, I understand that high-pressure situations are part of the job and can sometimes be unavoidable. Over time, I have learned to manage this stress by prioritizing tasks and focusing on what needs to be done immediately. I also believe in the importance of open communication with my team, so we can provide the best care for our patients. 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How do you ensure patient dignity while providing care?


Sample Answer


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
