Doctor Interview Questions

Can you describe a time when you had to deliver difficult news to a patient or their family? How did you handle it?

Discuss your communication strategies, emphasizing the balance between honesty and compassion. Show that you understand the importance of delivering difficult news in a way that respects the patient's dignity and supports their emotional wellbeing.

Sample Answer

I knew it would be a devastating revelation, so I took the time to carefully plan out how to communicate the news. I chose a private, comfortable location and made sure we wouldn't be interrupted. I assured her of our continued support and answered her questions to the best of my ability. It was a heartbreaking experience, but I believe I was able to provide her with the respect and care she needed in that moment.

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How do you handle a situation where a patient isn't following your medical advice?

How to Answer

This question is designed to test your communication skills and your ability to handle difficult situations.



The interviewer wants to know how you deal with non-compliant patients and whether you can remain patient and understanding. It is crucial to demonstrate empathy, understanding, and your ability to establish rapport with patients. Show your ability to educate and persuade them of the importance of following medical advice without being confrontational.

Sample Answer

In such situations, I try to understand the patient's perspective. Maybe they are scared or confused, so I ensure they fully comprehend the information. I explain the potential risks and benefits of the treatment, and the possible consequences of not following the advice. If they still refuse, I would respect their autonomy but continue to provide support and advice. I had a patient who was reluctant to take his diabetes medication because of potential side effects. By spending extra time to discuss his concerns, we managed to find an alternative solution, and he became more compliant with his treatment plan.

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How do you stay updated with the latest medical advancements and research?

How to Answer

In your response, you should emphasize your commitment to continuous learning and staying updated in your field. You could discuss how you stay informed by reading medical journals, attending conferences or seminars, participating in professional medical associations, or through any online platforms or courses.

Sample Answer

I think it's essential for any healthcare professional to stay abreast with the latest research and advancements in medicine. I regularly read journals such as The Lancet and The New England Journal of Medicine. I also attend medical conferences and seminars whenever possible. I am a member of a couple of professional medical associations which provide resources and forums to discuss latest findings and new techniques. 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What approach do you take in communicating with patients who have limited health literacy?

How would you handle a disagreement with a fellow healthcare professional about a patient's treatment plan?

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Can you tell us about a time when you made a mistake in patient care? How did you handle the situation and what did you learn from it?

How to Answer

When answering this question, it's important to demonstrate humility, accountability, and a commitment to learning and growth. Firstly, describe the situation and your role in it concisely. Then, detail how you recognized the error, what steps you took to rectify it, and how you ensured the patient's safety and wellbeing. Finally, discuss what you learned from this experience and how you've applied these learnings to prevent similar occurrences in the future.

Sample Answer

Early in my career, I once misinterpreted a patient's chart and prescribed a higher dose of medication than needed. I realized my mistake during a routine check and immediately consulted my senior. We corrected the dosage and informed the patient about the error, apologizing sincerely. From then on, I implemented a 'double-check' rule for myself when prescribing, and brought up the incident in our team meeting to discuss ways we could prevent such errors as a team. This experience reinforced for me the importance of vigilance, teamwork, and continuous learning in medical practice.

Can you describe a time when you had to make a critical decision in a short amount of time?

How to Answer

The interviewer is interested in your decision-making skills under pressure. Start by describing the situation you were in, focusing on the urgency and the stakes. Then, explain the decision you had to make, the factors you considered, and why you chose the course of action you did. Finally, share the outcome of your decision and what you learned from the experience.



Sample Answer

During my residency, I was on a night shift in the ER when a patient came in with symptoms of a heart attack. We were short-staffed, and I had to make a quick decision on the course of action. Based on the symptoms and the patient's medical history, I decided to administer clot-busting drugs immediately, even though the patient had a history of mild bleeding disorders. Time was of the essence and, considering the immediate threat to the patient's life, I felt this was the right decision. The patient responded well to the treatment and was stable until the cardiologist arrived. From this experience, I learned that sometimes, difficult decisions cannot be avoided in medicine, and it's important to stay calm and use your knowledge and intuition to make the best possible decision for the patient.

Can you give an example of a time when you had to advocate for a patient? What was the outcome?
