Description

Teaching Assistant Interview Questions



Can you describe a time when you had to deal with a difficult student? How did you handle the situation?

How to Answer:

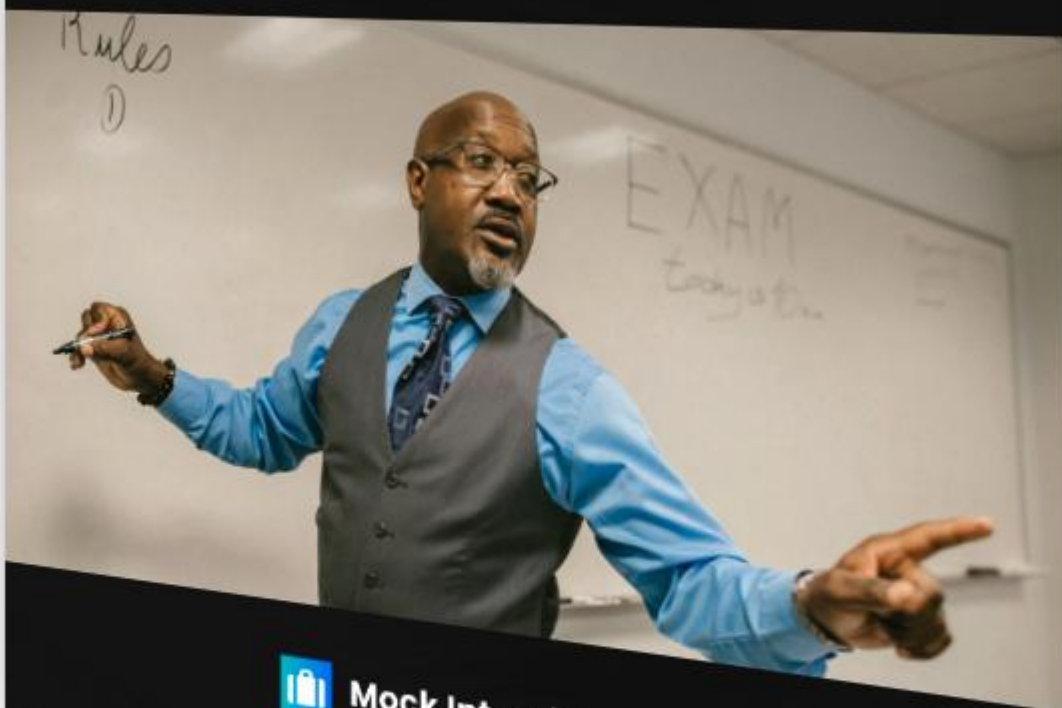
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Can you describe your experience with using technology in the classroom?

Can you describe a time when you effectively communicated a complex concept to a student?
